About Camp Kawartha

Camp Kawartha is an innovative environmental learning centre, dedicated to fostering stewardship in the Greater Peterborough region and throughout Ontario. Camp Kawartha has been in operation since 1921. We've been a not-for-profit charity since 1985. Over the past 10 years, Camp Kawartha has earned 16 awards for our work in promoting outdoor and environmental learning. Reaching over 10,000 participants per year, we help children, youth and adults acquire the skills to enjoy the outdoors, and we teach leadership skills, sustainable living practices, habitat protection and environmental responsibility.

Summer Camp

Providing day and overnight camp experiences for children ages 4 to 17, we teach children skills to appreciate, enjoy and protect the environment. We offer day camp, one, two and three week overnight camps, leadership sessions and tripping programs. We also work with local cottagers' associations to provide outreach environmental camps.

Outdoor Education

We offer over 60 curriculum-linked programs to grade twelve. Program offerings fall under five broad headings: Environmental Science, Canadian History, Environmental Arts, Adventure and Leadership, Recreation and Physical Education. We recently anchored all of our programs into a comprehensive stewardship framework.

Environment Centre

Located next to Trent University, we provide over 30 curriculum-linked programs to Elementary and High school students focused on sustainable living and ecology. We also provide workshops on environmental education to student teachers and to the general public.

Facility Rentals

We also rent both our facilities to groups. Our main facility on the shores of Clear Lake offers a scenic and relaxing venue for weekend retreats, team building, conferences, family reunions and green weddings. Our Environment Centre in Peterborough is ideal for meetings and workshops.

Executive Director's Message:

The world is becoming a scary place - especially for our children. And if you are a kid, you are hearing about so many big environmental issues - from climate change to habitat destruction, from oceans of plastic to endangered species and from the loss of biodiversity to melting glaciers and the list just goes on. You are thinking, "mom, dad - you gave me this world in the state that it is in - and you want me to what - fix it? How on earth can I do that? What action can I possibly take that will make any real difference?

If we are not careful, we can scare our children straight into apathy because the problems seem so overwhelming and the solutions so elusive. For those of us who are engaged in environmental and outdoor education, we need to remember that our first and most important task is to help people fall in love with their environment. We can do this by providing rich experiences in the outdoors, by teaching about the wonders of the natural world and by giving children the opportunity to engage in simple acts of hope. Planting a tree, harnessing the sun's energy to cook a meal, harvesting food from a local garden and learning to recognize the sounds and stories of our natural neighbours, these are all simple ways to build

a positive relationship with the earth and the living systems which sustain and nourish us.

Over the past year Camp Kawartha has worked hard to build a culture of stewardship and caring for the environment. We've reached over 10,000 people through all of our various programs. We've spearheaded the creation of a unique approach to environmental education called the Pathway to Stewardship & Kinship which involves the whole community. This project has been written up in Earth Education – a book that is published around the world. The Camp was one of the leaders in helping to establish this region as a UNESCO Regional Centre of Expertise in Sustainability Education. We also recognize that the magic of the outdoors should be for everyone. That is why over the past year, we've invested in a number of projects to help people of all abilities access our waterfront and climbing facilities.



Pathway to Stewardship & Kinship.

And thanks to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for supporting this vision, we are embarking on phase two of our Pathway to Stewardship & Kinship initiative. Collaborating with First Nations, public health, conservation authorities, school boards, early childhood educators and many others, Camp Kawartha has provided a road map for stewardship education for every age and stage of a child's development. Spreading the word:

The Pathway to Stewardship & Kinship has been presented on the world stage in a book called Earth Ed – Rethinking Education on a Changing Planet and was featured in a magazine called Green Teacher. Written by Jacob Rodenburg, these articles provide an overview of the Pathways project and suggest ways in which this approach might be integrated into community based stewardship education.

UNESCO Regional Centre of Expertise:

Camp Kawatha is proud to have played a lead role, along with Peterborough GreenUP and other organizations in helping to establish Kawartha/Peterborough/Haliburton as a UNESCO Regional Centre of Expertise (RCE) in Sustainability Education.

Sustainability Education:

An initiative of the United Nations University, there are 154 Regional Centres of Expertise (RCEs) on Sustainability Education around the world including 8 in Canada and 3 in Ontario. "RCEs" are networks of educational institutions, community, government, business and other organizations that work together to advance sustainability education. The Pathways to Stewardship and Kinship helps realize one of the 6 major objectives, which is to: "To implement age-appropriate sustainability and stewardship education frameworks from pre-school to secondary school, in both formal and informal settings".

Jacob Rodenburg has made presentations on environmental education to a number of international, national and provincial organizations including:

The International Conference on Children and Nature, the Ontario Woodlot Association, the Federation of Ontario Cottager's Associations., The Ontario Institute of Technology, The Ontario Association for Geographic and Environmental Education, National Play Conference among others.

Building Capacity, Improving Accesibilty

Climbing Wall Thanks to Ontario Trillium Foundation, the Rick Hansen Foundation, The Catherine & Maxwell Meighen Foundation, the Peterborough Foundation and other funders, we are delighted with the construction of our new accessible climbing wall. With a special belaying arm, this will permit participants with limited mobility to fully participate in a climbing experience. The wall has a series of interactive elements, from a clatter ladder to a cargo net.

Accessible Pathway Thanks to the Rick Hansen Foundation and the J.P. Bickell Foundation, we've created a wheelchair accessible pathway down to the waterfront. With a Hoyer lift and a low dock, the delights of canoeing, kayaking, swimming and sailing will be available to all those who would like to participate.

Sugar Shack With a new building and evaporator, the Camp can now showcase to students and visitors just how maple syrup is made and harvest the sweet gifts of the forest.

Birch Bark Wigwam We recently constructed an authentic Birch Bark Wigwam on our main site. Birch bark and elm bark wigwams were traditional shelters for the Anishinaabe First Nations of this region.

Summer Camp

Camp Kawartha is proud of how our summer camp has grown. And it is a credit to our phenomenal staff. Each staff member is a steward of the mission, vision and values of Camp Kawartha. As stewards, they teach, nurture and inspire these values in our campers. 

This past summer has been another record breaking year for Camp Kawartha. We've reached over 1,000 campers and offer a diversity of day and overnight programs for ages 4 to 17. At the same time, we are small enough to know every camper by name. And our camp continues to grow. As we partner with local cottager's associations in several unique outreach environment camps as well as our day camps held at the our Environment Centre – we teach ever more children about stewardship and nature connection, seeding the next generation of environmental citizens.




In this past school year we have hosted over 46 schools and over 3,400 students from Hamilton, London, Mississauga, Toronto, Montreal, Drummondville just to name a few of the many different cities and school boards. We are continually being seen as not just a destination for schools from the local area but from across different boards of Ontario and Quebec. Schools which once came as a single day visit or only brought a small group a couple of years ago are now coming for 2.5 days or bringing upwards of 80 students or more. In the case of our friends from Le College Stanislas in Montreal what started as a 3 day visit a couple of years ago has now evolved into 3 separate 4 days bookings. That's almost a full month per year from 1 school alone! Teachers can see the difference that the outdoor connections made here can have back within their classroom and they recognize our commitment to environmental stewardship and leadership.

As we grow as an educational centre, we look forward to weaving environmental education, outdoor adventure, and community building into an experience that students will remember for years to come.

It has been a busy year at the Environment Centre. We continue to be an inspiring venue for our community to learn about nature, ecology and sustainable living. As well providing programming to visiting school classes and to summer and winter campers, we continue to share our innovative approach to environmental education with aspiring and professional environmental educators locally and from across the province.

Accomplishments


- → In partnership with Hardwood Nature School, we now offer Forest Kindergarten programs for four to six and seven to nine year olds, one day per week.
- → The Camp Kawartha Environment Centre logged a total of 11,255 visits in our seventh year of operations. In total, 2,950 elementary and high school students participated in year seven or our operations and 760 teachers and parents accompanied them.
- → Since opening, the Camp Kawartha Environment Centre has directly taught 20,009 high school and elementary students. More than 3,400 University/ College Students and Student Teachers have participated in environmental education workshops. We've recorded over 47,900 visits!
- → This is the sixth year that we've partnered with Trent University in a unique Eco Mentor Program for student teachers. Student teachers graduating from this program receive an Eco-Mentor Certificate from both Trent University and Camp Kawartha. This year we are collaborating with Ontario Eco Schools to explore how we can expand the program. We've graduated over 275 student teachers from this program.



- → This is the second year of our Early Childhood Eco Mentor Program in partnership with Fleming College. By teaching Early Childhood Educators how to use nearby green spaces and encouraging young children to engage with their environment, not only will we have improved the health and physical activity of young children but we will have laid the foundation for future stewardship.
- → 567 students participated in our unique "Be A Watershed Steward" program in partnership with Otonabee Conservation. Students visited the Environment Centre and learned about watersheds, water conservation and sustainable living. These same students planted 10 pollinator gardens at local schools as a way to teach about the important role of pollinators in maintaining and enhancing watershed biodiversity and health.
- → This past year, we offered both a March Break Day Camp and a Winter Day Camp. In addition, we delivered 7 weeks of eco camp to a total of 253 campers.
- → This is the third year for Forest Fridays a program designed for homeschooling families. This year, 36 sessions took place logging 1,190 visits.
- → Nature Playscapes: Thanks to a generous contribution from the Gainey Foundation and the kindness of donors to our crowd source funding campaign, we were able to expand the number of interactive nature playscapes at the Camp Kawartha Environment Centre. This year we added a large insect hotel and giant bird's nest.
- → Working with Cathy Hooper, the Environment Centre offered a second year of workshops on how to establish long lasting permaculture spaces in local backyards. An edible permaculture garden has now been established at the Centre. Permaculture involves creating systems of food production that take little or no effort to maintain.
- → The Camp Kawartha Environment Centre has been an inspiring venue for many user groups to bear witness to sustainable living in action and to encourage nature connection. From visits by the MNR, Peterborough Field Naturalists, Ontario Nature, Trent University, Maryam Monsef, Green Communities Canada, Monarch Teacher Network of Canada, Fleming College, Kawartha Wild Nature Days among others, over 59 groups visited the centre.




Facility Rentals

Special Programs:

Environment Day: On May 15th, 2017 over 200 children from Kindergarten to Grade 8 participated in the 10th annual Environment Day organized by Camp Kawartha at Beavermead Park for the PVNC Catholic District School Board. With help from the Otonabee Conservation and Ecology Park we provided programs on: water quality, composting, local wildlife, soils and traditional skills.

Adventures in Understanding: Over 20 First Nations and Non First Nations youth participated in a unique canoe trip coordinated by Camp Kawartha's Glen Caradus. Organized by the Rotary Club of Peterborough-Kawartha and Camp Kawartha, this 6 day, 5 night, 100 km canoe trip through the Kawartha lakes teaches youth about First Nations history and fosters cross cultural understanding. This is the fourth year of the trip and the largest yet.

Fundraising:

It has been another successful year, thanks to the generosity of individual donors, foundations and businesses. This year we managed to raise more than \$110,000 to send deserving campers and students to Camp Kawartha. That means more than 200 children benefited from participating in the magic of camp.

Here is what one parent said: "I am so appreciative of the subsidy that allowed my daughter to take part in Camp Kawartha. As a single parent, I stress about whether or not my girls are going to get the same life experiences and opportunities as other children, and thank you to the donors at CK my daughter got an experience I could have never provided her on my own. Her resilient attitude and openness to learning new things was met with equal enthusiasm from her camp counsellors and I cried tears of joy leaving her behind as she began her journey. I look forward to many more years with CK and am very thankful to the donors who make this experience possible."

Surf and Turf:

Summer Camp:

Kids need a break from the city, from their parents, from their school friends. Camp Kawartha is a recharge for my daughter. She's come home these past two summers a different kid. She's confident but comes home knowing that she can manage without us. She loves nature and now sees her role in protecting and preserving it.
