We were ready to be told off and maybe lose out on tuck or another privilege the next day. The Night Hawk that night was Ludi and Rusty and as they came up to our cabin, they didn't say a word; they simply sat down on the porch of our cabin and started playing 'Cradle Song'. We all quietly listened and then went to sleep without saying another word to each other. Looking back, I remember thinking how fortunate I was to have grown up in a place where instead of being yelled at, I was a sung to.

That is my favourite Camp Kawartha memory.

The night turned into a mini camp reunion with about 15 alumni coming together from different camp generations.
